Capt. Paul C. Miller

Capt. Miller entered the Navy in 1994, after graduating from St. Joseph's University with a Master of Science degree in Health Care Administration. Prior to that, he received his Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Rutgers University.

Upon commissioning at Officer Indoctrination School in Newport, Rhode Island, he was assigned as deputy associate director for Hospital Services at the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Maryland. While assigned from 1994 to 1996, Capt. Miller was responsible for five departments and the Fisher Houses. He managed 108 enlisted, 198 civilians and a 5.3 million-dollar-budget.

From 1997 to 1999, Capt. Miller served as medical administration officer onboard the USS Kearsarge home ported in Norfolk, Virginia. He qualified as a Surface Warfare Medical Department officer and participated in a non-combatant evacuation operation (NEO) off the coast of Sierra Leone where he aided in the evacuation and medical treatment of more than 3,000 NEOs in three days.

In June 1999, he commenced studies at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California, where he earned a Master of Science degree in Information Systems Technology. Capt. Miller then served as chief information officer (CIO) at Naval Hospital Lemoore from September 2001 until June 2004. As CIO, he was a voting member of the Executive Steering Committee and was the command's number one choice for Acting DFA.

From May 2004 until June 2007, he has served as CIO and medical planner to the commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet Surgeon. He qualified as a fleet watch officer and completed the Plans, Operations, and Medical Intelligence (POMI) and the Joint Medical Staff Planning Courses and acquired the POMI sub-specialty code. He deployed to the Joint Special Operations Task Force – Philippines as the medical planner and liaison officer in support of the USNS Mercy 2006 deployment and the Global War on Terrorism. He was awarded the Capt. Joan Dooling Award in Information Technology and completed the Joint Medical Executive Skills Program receiving the AQD in Executive Medicine.

From June 2007 until June 2010, he served as the deputy Third Fleet surgeon for the commander, U.S. Third Fleet. He completed the CATF Surgeon Course and several FEMA Courses. His versatility and deft leadership were instrumental in the development of Third Fleet's Pandemic Influenza support plan and he was subsequently recognized by BUMED and CFFC for his expert implementation of this plan in managing the H1N1 Influenza Fleet mitigation and response.

From June 2010 until July 2012, he served as the director for Administration at Naval Hospital Naples where he managed 130 personnel in seven departments and a \$3 million dollar budget. He balanced multiple personnel



taskings required to support 35 Operational missions. He created a Healthcare Business Directorate which improved clinical operations and decreased costly MEDEVACS.

From July 2012 until June 2014, he served as the deputy CIO at Naval Medical Center San Diego. He employed process analysis and project management techniques in the design of an IT inventory management system which enabled virtual equipment and user audits as well as the ability to electronically secure hardware without physically locating each asset saving hundreds of thousands of labor dollars.

He completed the University of California, San Diego's Drug and Alcohol Counselor School. He volunteered counseling clients at Veterans Village of San Diego where he assisted homeless veterans who have substance abuse and/or mental health issues, including men and women who have recently returned from Iraq and Afghanistan.

Prior to his current assignment, Capt. Miller was assigned as the director, Pacific Joint Information Technology Center located on Maui, Hawaii. He expanded PJITC's commitment to the STEM and Women I Technology program aligning with the University of Hawaii, the Maui Economic Development Board and local high schools.

Capt. Miller is currently assigned as deputy command surgeon, U.S. Transportation Command, Scott Air Force Base, Illinois.

Capt. Miller's personal decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (four awards), the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, and nine other Service and Campaign ribbons and medals.
