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LEGISLATIVE ANALYSIS

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Well into the second session of the 116th Congress, members, staffers, and Services/CCMD Legislative Affairs Offices adjusted to the departure of Secretary Mattis, planned under (acting) SECDEF Shanahan, and now prepare for the Senate confirmation hearing determining if current Secretary of the Army Mark Esper will be the next SECDEF. This transition creates a domino effect of leadership not yet fully flushed out as one vacancy potentially leads to another.

National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA): The NDAA has been signed into law for 58 consecutive years and after an over twenty-hour marathon, the House Armed Services Committee (HASC) took the first step and passed the FY2020 defense policy bill on 13 June. The topline agreement, mostly along party lines, was \$733 billion for FY2020 which is \$17 billion less than what republican's request of \$750 billion. However, this is just one step towards it becoming a law and its signing isn't certain for several key differences, the largest being:

Iran. The Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) passed their version of the NDAA on 27 June after bi-partisan agreements were made to ensure it wouldn't be delayed. The Democratic minority requested a vote on an amendment from Sen Udall (D-NM) that would block funds for possible military action involving Iran without Congressional approval. The agreement allowed for a vote on Sen Udall's amendment *after* the vote on the NDAA. An additional compromise was made to allow senators, who are also presidential candidates, time to return to Washington and vote. There were challenges aside from travel to adopt the Udall amendment. In order to be adopted into the NDAA, 60 votes are required; it failed to pass on 28 June. In order to counteract Udall, Sen. Romney (R-UT) proposed a preventative amendment to guarantee funding for national defense against an attack from another nation (also requires 60 votes for adoption). This measure passed on 27 June and is now accepted into the Senate version of the NDAA. Prior to the compromise, Democrats stated that without a vote on Iran, there would not be an NDAA vote while Republicans favored a measure ensuring the President's hands were not tied if the US is attacked. Though the Senate and HASC have voted out their version of the NDAA, both chambers must agree to a final (identical) bill before it goes to the President for signature and negotiations are far from over.

The "so what" if the NDAA is not passed:

Servicemembers:

- Suspension of FY20 pay increase of 3.1% until NDAA passage
- USTRANSCOM: Planned programs/initiatives would be addressed
 - DP3 initiative
 - Tanker force structure and modernization
 - Mobility Capability Requirements Study (MCRS)
 - NDSF procurement of two used vessels
 - Construction of 1x new sealift vessel
 - Facility/asset protection from UAS

HAPPENINGS ON THE HILL:

- FY20 Appropriations Bills: The House passed its second minibus appropriations package (H.R. 3055) spanning Agriculture-FDA, Commerce-Justice-Science, Interior-Environment, Military Construction-VA and Transportation-HUD on 25 Jun 19.
- House Democrats released a \$4.5 billion supplemental appropriations bill (H.R. 3401).
 - Unlike the Senate bill, the House bill omits \$145 million for the Army, USMC, Air Force and Army National Guard. The House measure would block a Trump administration attempt to cut Central America aid. Senate bill wouldn't weigh in.
